Fall 2012

Fall is a busy time in the garden, with raking leaves and cleaning up beds the primary tasks. But this year, instead of cutting back plants and flower heads, we're leaving most "as they are" so students can explore the garden's "sleepy" phase on sunny winter days. **What can classes investigate during winter?** Seed pods, plant stem shapes (round, square, triangular!), tree bark, animal tracks, evergreens, plants that hold dead leaves, even signs of new bud growth as spring approaches. No matter what the season, nature offers a wealth of exploration for young scientists!

Garden Mondays: Fall is also prime time for relocating plants to happier spaces and planting new perennials. The garden committee has rearranged some plants, introduced some new ornamental allium bulbs, and with the help of several classes sown winter cover crops in the raised beds. Haldane students also made **scarecrows**, **brooms**, **and leaf rubbings** after school: fun was had by all!

The new **Junior Gardeners** enrichment class has been busy as well. Taught by Farm-to-School's own Sandy McKelvey, the group has harvested veggies from the Chef-in-the-Classroom bed and planted 64 garlic cloves for next year.

Reminder: Please continue to keep garden gates closed even during the winter months.



Notice any dinosaur or caveman 'snake gourds' suspended along the garden fence? These ornamental **Lagenaria gourds** are edible when young but mostly dried for making birdhouses.

FALL GARDEN HIGHLIGHTS

- Kindergarten: Mrs. Cretara's class harvested pumpkins and gourds from their patch!
- 1st Grade: Mrs. Comerford's students helped move the banana plant into their classroom for overwintering. They dug out all the tropical plants and planted tulip bulbs in that bed.
- 2nd Grade: All four classes toured the garden, learned about garden tools, and took plants and gourds back to their classrooms. Ms. Isler's class planted tulip bulbs then sowed a winter cover crop on top.
- **3**rd **Grade:** Mrs. Pray's class investigated plant parts by studying a carrot, radish, beet and flowers from the garden. They also looked at the reproductive structure of nasturtium flowers (male and female parts) and tried a dye-absorption experiment with white garden flowers.
- Mrs. Geller's Class picked herbs from the Herb Bed for Cindy to use in the cafeteria (fennel, oregano, parsley, rosemary, thyme, lemon thyme, basil and sage); they're drying herbs in their classroom over winter; and they picked Kale to prepare with garlic at their "Winter Cabin Restaurant" as part of their Project Careers Class.
- **The Tropical Bed** was destroyed by our first hard frost but many of these plants are being stored for replanting next year. Did you know that Elephant Ears grow from a **corm**, Cannas from a **rhizome**, and Dahlias from **tubers**? These underground parts store energy for plants the same way **bulbs** store energy for garlic or tulips!
- **The Chef-in-the-Classroom** raised bed was replanted with garlic by enrichment students. They also harvested (and ate!) beets, potatoes, kale, broccoli, delicata squash, swiss chard and are monitoring brussels sprouts development.
- The Historically Useful Plants Bed supplied broom corn for making our scarecrow brooms!
- The Sensory Bed's collection of scented geraniums were all moved indoors for winter.
- The Butterfly Courtyard's two central butterfly bushes were relocated since they blocked other plants in the courtyard. Three butterfly bushes remain so the butterflies will be back!

In October, Mrs. Moeller's **3rd graders** took a special field trip to Glynwood Farm for their **Chef-in-the-Classroom** program. Farm educator Carolyn Llewellyn gave them a tour of the farm and talked about the different edible parts of plants. The students cooked a healthy fall harvest soup with produce from Haldane's garden (students harvested kale and potatoes the day before) and with eggs and herbs from Glynwood. The following week the soup was served in the cafeteria for the entire school!

LOOKING AHEAD TO WINTER

The Philipstown Garden Club's (PGC) **Haldane Greenhouse** project is underway! PGC will be painting and renovating the interior over winter so teachers can use the greenhouse come spring. Exterior glass replacement will take place over summer vacation next year. Contact us if you'd like to help out!
