Plant Fall Bulbs 2017 October

Garden Parent Outdoor Lesson #4

Objective: A hands on gardening lesson that plants bulbs. Present a broad overview of bulb botany. Integration of thinking about the seasons - planting now to look forward to late winter/early spring flowers. Integrate concepts of measuring by inches. Photograph the garden beds after planting, and be able to reference back to these when the bulbs emerge in the spring.

Time/location: The entire lesson can be done in 30-40 minutes in the school garden. **Materials:** (snow drop) Bulbs, Shovels, gloves, Warm Soapy Water in a Bowl, towel, paper and pencil, plant based dye, tape, kraft paper, onions (halved), Field Notebooks, 3" measuring sticks (C&E?) **Poem:** Ode to Bulb-Eating Rodents, Eudora Welty

The Lesson:

Part 1 / Intro and Instructions 5 min

- -Students will gather by the picnic benches and receive instructions and supplies to plant bulbs, including how deep the bulbs will need to be planted. Brief intro about what a bulb is.
- -Show photo of snowdrop ask when they think it will bloom, what else is in garden, why called a snowdrop etc..

Part 2 / Planting 15 min

- -Each child will plant 2 bulbs in a designated area, focusing on spacing and depth below soil.
- -Put on gloves, Get a mini trowel. They find a flag with their class color. Dig a narrow hole around 3" deep. Place bulb pointy side up. Sprinkle in a little bone meal. (have each adult have some bone meal in a yogurt container and they can come to the kid who needs some. Just a sprinkle is needed for fertilizer.) Cover up with dirt. Repeat if there is time. (up to 2 bulbs per kid). Take off gloves, wash hands in prepped bowl warm soapy water, dry.
- -<u>Deep Breath Pause:</u> Be a bulb. Breathe in the air just the way the roots absorb in the water, feel it go to all parts of your body, and breath out.

Part 3 / Bulb Drawings 10min

-The kids will make observational drawings of halved onions. The drawing can be taped into their field notebooks later.

Part 4 / Poetry & Movement 5 min

Squirrel, squirrel, burning bright,

Gather in a circle, and read excerpts from "Ode to Bulb-Eating Rodents", Eudora Welty

Do not eat my bulbs tonight!
I think it bad and quite insidious
That you should eat my blue tigridias.
Squirrel, Sciurus vulgaris,

Must you make your midnight snack, mouse,
